ORGANIZATION DESCRIPTION

Buffalo Niagara Heritage Village is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation located on a 35-acre campus. Our Historic Village contains ten buildings built during the 19th century and moved to our campus when the Town threatened to demolish them during the Town's rapid growth and development.
