VOCABULARY

Collaboration | noun | the action of working with someone to produce or create something

Play | a form of drama that primarily consists of dialogue between characters and is intended for theatrical performance rather than reading

Playwright | a person who writes plays

Acting | an activity in which a story is told by means of its enactment by an actor who adopts a character

Storytelling | the activity of writing or telling stories

Plot | the sequence of events in which each event affects the next one through the principle of cause-and-effect

Create | noun | bring something into existence

Art | noun | the expression or application of human creative skill and imagination

Artist | noun | a person engaged in an activity related to creating art, practicing the arts, or demonstrating an art, often referring to visual arts
