PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Dave the potter was an enslaved person in South Carolina in the early to mid 1800s, however he went beyond the limits of most enslaved people through his art. Because of his artistic talent it seems that his literacy (which was outlawed) was forgiven or at least ignored. He boldly signed his pots and often left short poems scratched into the clay as well. Students will examine David Drake's pottery and poetry and then make vessels inspired by both. They will learn about an important historical figure, the ceramic process, and crafting words.
